#### **Traffic Safety**

We all share a common concern about the safety of our children. Together we can ensure the safety of our children by choosing safety over convenience. If you use Sardis Street to drop off or pick up your child, please consider the following suggestions: Carefully observe the no stopping zones on either side of the crosswalk.

RESPECT the role the parent volunteers play in keeping the traffic moving and minimizing the pick up delays by having you pull forward. Remember that if you cannot pick up your child in a timely manner you should circle the school and try again. Parking creates congestion and compromises the safety of our volunteers. If you do not respect our volunteers and the rules set out by the by-laws, the drop-off and pick up zone in front of our school may be taken away.

#### Be Patient, Be Safe, Be Respectful

- All children must use the crosswalk (Parents are asked to use the crosswalk as models of good examples)
- Please do not use driveways to turn around
- U-turns on the street are illegal
- Please do not double park
- Do not leave your vehicle running and unattended
- Do not permit your children to get out of your vehicle on the traffic side of the car. Ensure that they get out on the sidewalk side.
- Do not drop off/pick up students in the staff parking lot.

Make arrangements to drop off or pick up 15 minutes before and after school to help minimize traffic congestion.



#### Please Obey the Law:

- Respect the 30-km/h-school zone and playground speed limit (penalty \$173-\$460)
- No Parking zone means you may not leave your car, even for just a minute, you may stop briefly to drop off or pick up passengers (penalty\$125-\$300 plus towing)
- Respect the role of the student crossing guards, they are working hard to create a save community for everyone in our school community, students and parents alike.

#### **Summary Sheet of School Goals**

#### Essential Question: How do we Create a Community where Everyone can thrive?

<u>Analyzing</u> - How does your evidence inform next steps? What is contributing to this area of focus? How will students benefit academically, personally, socially? **District and School evidence points to a continued focus on Reading and Reading for Information** – with a large ELL population and gaps in identified groups.

A secondary focus of data from school is based on surveys and climate study is where we have derived focus about SEL / self-assessment. Many of the initiatives are focused at getting students ready for their learning with self-assessment, these are also being highlighted with the new reporting order of core competencies and student involvement (assessment as learning)

Currently Tracking Primary Boys, Grade 2 who are low in <u>all Language areas</u> \*\*\*Primary Reading is lower that other areas in our school, monitoring and tracking.

Grade 7's reading large gap between, district numbers and school numbers.

Intermediate boys are lower than intermediate girls (measurable gap > 5%).

#### School Data-

Reading – Using the district PS rubric we collect fall data shows some grade levels require attention – many of the school tiered inventions support those groups (RTI).

Self-Assessment – The Rubric and analysis shows that students in the intermediate grades are getting better at self –assessment and reflection and that in the lower grades that is a challenge, perhaps that is due to their lack of cognitive awareness (this is something we should look at a little closer at.

#### <u>Provincial Data</u>

**M.D.I Data** – 42 % of are only connected to 1 individual at school (large gap to the rest of the district < 20%.

#### **NEXT STEPS**:

#### What requires further attention? Where to next?

To continue to look, self –assessment and regulations with an implementation to reporting to parents – being more inclusive by educating parents with research, best practice implementation and inclusion.

Making Learning Visible has become a KEY concept in our communication with parents. Highlight research and best practices with them through various school communications.

Website, Newsletters, Bulletin Boards, Scrolling electronic Monitors

Research from John Haddie, Lee Crockett & Ron Richhart has helped create strategies that support the work we are doing about Improving Reading for information through Inquiry & communicating student learning to Parents.

8:58 - 12:05 Morning Session Class instruction begins. All students MUST report to the office for a late slip after 9:05am.

Before 9:05am please go directly to your classroom and ask the teacher to mark you late.

#### 10:30 - 10:45 Recess

Please provide your child with a healthy snack.

#### 12:05 - 12:55 Lunch Break

Students eat lunch in their classrooms until the 2<sup>nd</sup> lunch bell rings at 12:18. At this time all children who have finished eating should go outside

#### 12:55 - Warning bell

Lunch break ends, and all children enter building for afternoon session.

#### 1:00 - 3:00 Afternoon Session

Class instruction begins. Same procedure as in the morning. 

Please respect the learning times of students as much as possible and deliver messages, lunches, etc. to the office during recess or lunch times. There is no supervision of students before 8:53 am and we advise parents and students to time their arrival at school to coincide with the 8:53 am bell.

It is important for students to be on time for school so they do not miss morning announcements.

Students arriving after 9:05 must report to the office and sign in. Before 9:05 teacher will mark them late in their classrooms Also, parents are asked to pick up their children at 3:00 sharp.

There is no supervision for children after 3:00 pm.


